Vocabulary and definitions

Word	Definition
Prejudice	A preconceived opinion that is not based on reason or actual experience
Discrimination	The unjust or prejudicial treatment of different categories of people, especially on the grounds of race, age, or sex.
Diversity	The inclusion of individuals representing more than one national origin, colour, religion, etc,
Stereotype	A stereotype is an over-generalized belief about a particular category of people. It is an expectation that people might have about every person of a particular group. The type of expectation can vary; it can be, for example, an expectation about the group's personality, preferences, or ability.
Asylum seeker	An asylum seeker is a person who fled their home country because of war or other factors harming them or their family, enters another country and applies for asylum, i.e. international protection, in this other country.
