Vocabulary and definitions

Word	Definition
Humanist	An advocate or follower of the principles of humanism.
Humanism	A belief that human needs and values are more important than religious beliefs, or the needs and desires of humans. An example of humanism is the belief that the person creates their own set of ethics.
Curiosity	A strong desire to know or learn something.
Celebrant	A person who performs a rite, especially a priest at the Eucharist.
Empathy	The ability to understand and share the feelings of another.
Atheism	The lack of belief in the existence of God or gods.
Agnosticism	The view that the existence of God, of the divine or the supernatural is unknown or unknowable
Evolution	The process by which different kinds of living organism are believed to have developed from earlier forms during the history of the earth.
Natural selection	The process whereby organisms better adapted to their environment tend to survive and produce more offspring
Compassion	Sympathetic pity and concern for the sufferings or misfortunes of others
